We firmly believe that sustained growth in our agricultural GDP, up to 5%, is likely to catalyze major economic transformations, reducing poverty and improving the living conditions of our fellow citizens.

However, to meet these ambitious challenges, we must stimulate innovation at every level of our agricultural sector.

Digitalization is a central lever in our development strategy. We fully recognize the importance of agricultural data and information systems in guiding our public policies and strengthening our resilience in the face of the challenges of the 21st century. We are therefore committed to establishing inclusive digital services, offering players in the agricultural sector relevant tools to increase their productivity and sustainability.

In 2023, we distributed around 35,000 producer cards. For 2024, our ambition is to multiply these efforts, aiming to at least double this number.

Developing human capital and digital skills is also a top priority. It is important to work together to facilitate the adoption of digital solutions and prepare future generations to take full advantage of them.

Furthermore, we aspire to foster innovation and digital entrepreneurship in agriculture, convinced that the most innovative solutions will emerge from the private sector.

Ladies and Gentlemen, we are at a pivotal moment in our history, where challenges compete with opportunities. By pooling our efforts and encouraging

innovation at all levels, we can realize our vision of a secure food future for generations to come.

In conclusion, I would like to express my sincere gratitude to IFAD for its tireless commitment to agricultural development in Madagascar. Together, we can shape a future where food security is not just a goal, but a tangible reality for all.
