- 1. What progress has been made so far in strengthening institutional arrangements and national ecosystems for SSC/TrC in the Global South since the adoption of the BAPA+40 outcome document?
- 2. What are the most pressing capacity development needs and gaps to better plan and manage South-South and triangular cooperation in developing countries?
- 3. What were the success factors and challenges of SSC/TrC during COVID-19? What lessons can be drawn from the COVID-19 experience on how to strengthen the importance and relevance of SSC/TrC ecosystem? Is there any lesson learned for SSC/TrC to respond to climate change and other global crises?
- 4. Some countries have devised innovative and non-conventional delivery mechanisms for South-South and triangular cooperation leveraging UN field presence, entailing low transaction costs, lighter administrative structures what have we learnt from these experiences?
- 5. How can we improve the understanding of and build the institutional capacity and ecosystems necessary for SSC/TrC among all stakeholders? What would be recommendations for development cooperation agencies and international development community to achieve this?

By doing so, the session will address the role of different SSC/TrC stakeholders—from emerging economies to multilateral development banks, triangular partners, and UN system entities—in

mobilizing resources and innovative finance to support the Global South's SSC/TrC efforts. The session will feature speakers that can share their first-hand experience and lessons learned in financing SSC/TrC initiatives especially during the pandemic. It will also discuss how the lessons-learned could be of use when developing countries respond to other urgent global crises including, climate change through SSC/TrC.

Guiding questions:

- 1. What financing mechanisms can developing countries apply to facilitate SSC/TrC as an important vehicle to accelerate the SDGs attainment? How do developing countries align domestic financing, aid, foreign direct investment, other forms of capital to facilitate SSC/TrC?
- 2. What challenges and opportunities did developing countries have in accessing SSC/TrC finance during COVID-19?
- 3. What lessons could be learnt from the two years of the pandemic to secure adequate financing to boost SSC/TrC under the current global contexts and constraints?
- 4. What is the role of different SSC/TrC stakeholders and what measures can they take in bridging the financing gaps and growing needs in the global South?
- 5. What role do Southern-led development banks and the private sector currently play in financing SSC/TrC and how can this be further strengthened?

The UN system entities will share their ongoing efforts for strengthening SSC/TrC ecosystem not only within member states but also within the UN system, in consideration of the UN System-wide Strategy on SSC/TrC and the Action Plan. The session will also discuss the GA Res/A/76/221 which calls upon the UNDS to mainstream SSTC in UNSDCFs at country-level and in regional collaborative frameworks.

- 1. What efforts and progress have been made by the UN system entities in supporting member states' capacity building in SSC/TrC institutionalization and ecosystem enhancement since the adoption of the BAPA+40 outcome document?

- 3. How can developing countries leverage the UN system support in building capacity to better plan and manage SSC/TrC?
- 4. What are the new opportunities and implications that the UN System-wide Strategy on SSC/TrC and the UNDS reform would bring to strengthening SSC/TrC ecosystem at country, regional and global levels?
- 5. How can Member states and UNDS ensure mainstreaming of SSTC in UNSDCFs at country-level and in regional collaborative frameworks? Are there good examples and experiences?
